## Thoughts from the President

Paul Moore, Jr., ('41) in "A Touch of Laughter" in My Harvard, My Yale, at 198, 203-4 said:

"Central to (Yale's) identity was...a powerful emphasis on community leadership and an abiding commitment to public service...When I was an undergraduate, 'you were expected to 'pull your weight' as a Yale citizen, going out for athletics, or singing, or debating or Dwight Hall, the organization sponsoring good work.' So strong was the 'do something for Yale' ethos that failing to participate in such activities meant that 'you would not be tapped for a senior society, a dreadful thought meant to strike fear in our heart.'"

Yale's fundamental mission, Moore believed, was "to forge a serious public spirited young man who would take his place in industry, law, academic life or public service."

In 1701 a charter was granted for a school "wherein Youth may be instructed in the Arts and Sciences (and) through the blessing of Almighty God may be fitted for Publick employment both in Church and Civil State."

Per the current mission statement: "Yale is committed to improving the world today and for future generations through outstanding research and scholarship, education, preservation, and practice."

The Yale Alumni Association of the Northwest (YAANW) "advances the mutual interests of Yale University, its alumni and friends in our region. We accomplish this through recruitment of promising students, and activities promoting education, intellectual inquiry, collegiality and **public service.**"

Dean Sterling is highly regarded and is very involved in interfaith discussions domestically and around the world as well as issues as broad as faith and sustainability. **"Building Bridges--National and Global Politics and Religious Tensions"**

Gregory E. Sterling, The Reverend Henry L. Slack Dean and the Lillian Claus Professor of New Testament, Yale Divinity School

The globalization of our world has raised the profile of religion as a factor in international relations. The last two US presidents have established three different offices in the State Department and White House that deal with religion globally and nationally. Within the US the recent presidential campaign set religion in high relief both as a rallying factor and as a factor in determining who enters the US. Dean Sterling will address the role of religion as a source of conflict and as a source of peace. He will discuss how religion can serve as a means to build bridges rather than walls and will share how Yale Divinity School is preparing future leaders for this new reality as an example of how communities of all types can flourish together.

## **Control of Water Pollution in Minnesota: Most of What We “Know” is Wrong: An Environmental Sustainability Series Event**

Do you believe that overbearing state agencies are killing jobs with regulation, particularly in northern Minnesota’s Iron Range? Or do you see Minnesota’s regulatory agencies as heroic protectors of the public interest in clean water? Either way, you would be wrong. Using in-depth experience as WaterLegacy’s Counsel and Advocacy Director, Paula Maccabee will explain how the federal Clean Water Act was envisioned and how it works in practice. Finally, she will propose a role that science, judicial review and new alliances can play in holding regulators accountable to protect clean water.

Paula Maccabee is a graduate of Amherst College (1977) and Yale University Law School (1981) with 36 years of experience in public interest law. Paula has served on the St. Paul City Council and as a Special Assistant Attorney General. In her private practice, she has represented non-profit organizations, local governments, businesses and diverse citizens’ groups seeking environmental protection.

Paula was named as one of Minnesota Lawyer’s 2010 “Attorneys of the Year” for her public interest work and received the 2015 Harvey G. Rogers Environmental Health Leadership Award from the Minnesota Public Health Association for her lifetime of work to protect environmental health.

For the past eight years, Paula has served as Counsel and Advocacy Director for WaterLegacy, a much-awarded Minnesota environmental non-profit. Some of her recent publications include [Pipelines, Power Lines & Organic Farms](#), [Mercury, Mining and the Clean Water Act](#), and [Tribal Authority to Protect Water Resources and Reserved Rights under Clean Water Act Section 401](#).

The Department of English presents nonfiction writer Andrew Solomon, who won the National Book Award for *The Noonday Demon: An Atlas of Depression* (2001) and the National Book Critics Circle Award and the Dayton Literary Peace Prize for the 2012 follow-up, *Far from the Tree: Parents, Children, and the Search for Identity*. Both were bestsellers. In spring 2016 Solomon published *Far and Away: Reporting from the Brink of Change*, which the

Minneapolis Star Tribune called a “deeply humane book [that] cuts against the grain, urging readers to exit their comfort zones and engage with new people and unfamiliar points of view...Solomon's reporting from far-flung places is surprisingly powerful, a bighearted response to a divisive era.”

With a PhD in psychology from Jesus College, Cambridge, Solomon is a Professor of Clinical Psychology at Columbia University Medical Center, and President of PEN American Center.

#### Yale for Life 2017 Programs

##### **World Order and the Meaning of History**

June 4 - 10, 2017

Lead Professors: Charles Hill and Norma Thompson

Is the modern world order permanent, or in question? Is the state still the basic unit of international affairs, or are empires coming back? What are the prospects for the historical categories of war, revolution, diplomacy, and peace? What will become of "statecraft" in the 21st century? Yale for Life now harnesses the strengths of two of Yale's great programs: Directed Studies, and Grand Strategies, to seek in foundational texts, artworks, and more, the tools to understand statesmanship, the relationships among political entities, and – ultimately – what history itself means. The legendary Charles Hill will be joined by Humanities Director of Undergraduate Studies Norma Thompson as our guides – but also as our fellow questioners, for this course, "invented" last year, broke new ground. Last year, in fact, we were joined by former U.S. Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger, for a special "surprise" seminar for our 21 students!

In 2016, "World Order" filled in 23 minutes, so we are offering it again. If this course were offered to undergraduates, it would be the object of "Grand Strategies"-like buzz and jockeying for enrollment. You can be part of it, simply with a click!
